
## **Introduction:**

The Biblical book called Daniel is one of the great end-time prophecies of the scriptures. It is classified as one of the two significant apocalyptic pronouncements, the other being Revelation, from God's heart to humankind. They are "love letters" – gifts from the sovereign God to give hope to a lost world. The writers of the study journal we are using in this course state, "Daniel and Revelation both reveal the great cosmic conflict as the curtain is drawn aside and readers are shown the struggle between God and the powers of evil.... The message of both books is that God has triumphed and is working His will to make these devilish deceptions plain to all, at which time He will no longer allow them to continue." (p. 1) Daniel begins in a narrative, revealing God's providence, power, and presence and that nothing in this life takes place without His rule. In this introduction to the study of this book, we will consider the stage, the backdrop - the historical context of this great prophetic message.
